This month's [ground-breaking ruling](#) by the International Court of Justice has far-reaching implications for adaptation including expectations on states to use their "best possible efforts" to develop adaptation planning, enhance climate adaptation, strengthen resilience and reduce climate vulnerability "based on the best possible science".

UN [Secretary-General António Guterres](#) described the ruling as "a victory for our planet, for climate justice and for the power of young people to make a difference".

We are delighted to announce an opening keynote speaker for AF2025 is **Cynthia Houniuhi, assistant lecturer in law at USP** and the President of Pacific Island Students Fighting Climate Change. While Cynthia is at pains to stress this historic ruling was a collective effort, her leadership and insight was pivotal in launching the court case. We are honoured to host Cynthia and members of PISFCC, and to support talanoa opportunities for young Pacific leaders throughout the AF2025 proceedings.



Watch out for future news of our other esteemed keynotes and opening speakers but meanwhile we know the Adaptation Futures community joins the Science Committee in thanking Cynthia and the PISFCC very profoundly for their vision and impact.

As AF2025 presenter Dalila Gharbaoui, an adjunct research fellow at the University of Canterbury says, the ruling highlights adaptation as well as mitigation. It should be a "turning point" for action, Gharbaoui said, as the advisory "unequivocally states that adaptation is a legal obligation under international law".

Living Labs spotlight

On day four, the exciting programme shifts to Ōtautahi Christchurch's beautiful Town Hall – and also offers a chance for you to go into the field, with [our range of Living Lab events](#).

In the weeks leading up to AF2025, we'll showcase a selection of these. First up is "How Do We Get Mass Behavioural Change For Transformational Climate Adaptation", hosted by BECA.

BECA's business director of climate risk & resilience Cushla Loomb will co-host the workshop. It's a hands-on event: with participatory tools, co-design challenges, and creative storytelling. You will walk away with new insights into how to communicate, collaborate, and create change.



We asked Cushla a few questions:

How has climate change shaped your career?

I have always been passionate about how our environment is changing and what this means for communities. In 2007, I worked with the Marshall Island communities and got to see first-hand the challenges they face from climate change on a daily basis – and what they have overcome. From that point, I have focused on working with communities, organisations and government authorities on the steps we can take to address the impacts arising from a changing climate.

Art is a key focus of your workshop. Does a person need artistic talent to join?

Not at all! Art is not necessarily about the skill of painting or drawing. We will explore art through an Indigenous lens, and in particular a Māori lens – where art is manifest in multiple ways from games through to [kapa haka](#) and include things like weaving, carving and storytelling. There is no pressure to participate. In many cases, participants may just observe and feel the wairua (spirit and sense of connection to something bigger than ourselves) and be inspired by that alone.

What do you hope participants take away from the day?

Ideally, people will leave with a fresh perspective, unexpected insights and a renewed sense of purpose and hope. Beyond practical ideas, we want everyone to make valuable connections – with peers, mentors, and industry professionals that spark ongoing conversations and future collaborations. Ultimately, our aim is for participants to feel inspired, empowered, and equipped to drive positive change within their own communities and organisations.
